






With his companions in the shade of the beech trees whilst in his home village we remember him by the seat around the chestruit tree.

It is 12cm disc cast in bronze gunmetal with an image of Britannia and a lion: two dolphins represent Britain's sea power: the emblem of Imperial Germany's eagle is being torn to pieces by another lion: Britannia holds an oak spray with leaves and acorns. Beneath this is a rectangular tablet with the deceased's name cast into the plaque. No rank is given, showing the equality of their sacrifice. On the outer edge of the disk are the words, 'He died for freedom and honour'.

1,355,000 plaques were issued, which used a total of 450 tonnes of bronze,<sup>I</sup>and continued to be issued into the 1930s to commemorate people who died as a consequence of the war.
